
Guild Easter Fayre - 1st April

The Easter Code

Karen ran another very successful Easter Code for the Children of Forth Primary School and Nursery. We asked Karen a few questions about the Easter Code:

How long have you been doing Easter code? We started the Easter Code in 2016.

How many children were involved this year? We had every class at Forth Primary and also the nursery which was about 170 children.

What kind of activities do you provide for the children? The Easter Code is a fun way to teach the children about Jesus, the last week of Jesus' life, his death and resurrection. We create 4 different areas:-

- A night garden which is to tell the story of Jesus praying in the Garden of Gethsemane.
- A courtyard with a fire which they all sit around while learning about Peter denying Jesus. We give them marshmallows with melted chocolate as a little treat.
- An art space where each of the children make an Easter card to take home.
- We also have a treasure hunt in the church where we hide the 12 disciples' names and 30 silver coins. The pews are a great place for hiding them.

At snack time we make fresh pancakes which they all enjoy.

We have questionnaires for every child and we always finish with a song and actions.

What do you hope children will gain from Easter code? We hope the children will learn more about Jesus while having fun.

Which activity do you like best? I like the treasure hunt best; I love seeing the children get excited to find everything in the time they are allowed.

Future of Forth St Paul's: As you know we are going through a process of review in cluster groups and our current proposal going forward to presbytery for our cluster area of Carnwath, Carstairs, Forth and Lanark St Nicholas parishes is for a rural parish (Carnwath, Carstairs and Forth) and a town parish (Lanark St Nicholas). This has to be agreed by presbytery in September before going forward for full agreement by Church of Scotland by the end of the year. We will begin to work more collaboratively with our neighbouring churches.

Where were you born?

In Main Street, Braehead on 20th November 1930.

Please tell us a bit about yourself and your family.

I had two older brothers called Alex and John. I met my husband at the chip shop in Forth. We continued to meet there on a Saturday night for chips. We got engaged at the picture house in Lanark and we got married on 1st February 1958 in Wilsontown Church. We had two sons Sandy and Tommy. I have 3 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren who give me a lot of pleasure. My great granddaughter Georgia was Queen in Forth Gala Day this year.

Which school did you go to?

I went to Braehead Primary School till I was ten years old. We then moved to Forth in 1940 during the war and I went to Forth School till I was 14.

My gran (Jack) says you used to play when you were a wee girl in her garden. Can you tell us a bit about this?

My Gran and Grandpa stayed in the house where your Gran and Grandpa live now in Braehead. We had a lot of happy times playing in their back garden. Our treat was eating gooseberries at the bottom of the garden. I remember fondly when Grandpa lifted me onto this chair and said "come on my wee topsy" which was his pet name for me.

Did you go to Sunday School?

Yes, I went to Sunday School at Braehead. We all went as a family to church every Sunday and my brother and I would fight to see who sat with Grandpa Young (who was church officer for years), as he always had pan drops, but Grandpa always made sure we all got one. I enjoyed it when Band of Hope came to the Session House – they encouraged us to sing or say a poem. When we moved to Forth, we went to Wilsontown Church where I joined the church, joined in the choir and became a Sunday School teacher. When Wilsontown church closed, we went to Forth church. I became an elder on 4th April 1999.

What do you enjoy most about Church?

I love to sing and listen to the singing. My favourite time in Church is Christmas.

What job did you have?

I worked in the Tinto picture house in Forth as an usherette and in the projector room which showed the film. It was straight across from where the Co-op is now.

What were your hobbies?

I loved my bike and dancing. My friend Helen Lauder and I cycled to Dumfries for a weeks holiday where we worked on a farm. Another time, we cycled to Helen's Aunt and Uncles in Fife for a weeks holiday. I love the dancing and still went to Ravenstruther hall on a Thursday night at 92. I had to give it up a couple of weeks ago. My favourite dance is the silver wedding waltz.
