## Pancake recipe

Ingredients
$60 z$ sugar
12 oz self-raising sieved flour
2 eggs
Heaped teaspoon baking powder
1 tablespoon cooking oil
Pinch of salt

## Method

1. Mix $1 / 2$ milk and $1 / 2$ water in a mug (may need more).
2. Grease an electric griddle set at number 3 or a heavy based pan.
3. Place salt, baking powder, sugar and flour in a bowl. Make a well in the centre. Add the eggs and half milk and water mixture.

4. Beat to a smooth batter and then beat in the rest of the milk and water mixture to a batter of thick cream (may need more milk and water mixture).
5. Drop spoonfuls on to a greased girdle or pan. When bubbles rise to the surface turn. Leave approximately 30 seconds to 1 minute until golden brown.
6. Lift onto a wire tray and cover with a clean tea towel.
7. Enjoy!

- Third Section - Toys come out from our toy cupboard and Mainly Music leaders supervise. This is the time Mums/Grans/Carers sit together and have tea/coffee and cakes/biscuits. This is a time for them to relax and get to know one another.

## School Assemblies are always tricky by Ch



School assemblies, especially secondary school assemblies, must be among one of the hardest tasks performed by ministers. One minister, who had just retired, told me he was so glad to have performed his last secondary school assembly. He said it had been awful. It was made very clear to him that no one wanted to be there, some were continually fidgeting, others noisily moving their chairs, some sighing very loudly and he was sure that he could see a group on their phones out of the corner of his eye. He told me, that no sooner had the last syllable of amen sounded from his lips, when they very rudely all stood up and marched off and that was THE TEACHERS.

Sighing, often seems to happen at school assemblies. At one school, there was an exceptionally pleasant and caring minister, but sometimes he went on a little long. There was a very nice primary 1 pupil who, after 10 minutes would give a very loud and heartfelt sigh, where upon he always said he would just leave it there. Many times I have often wished I had a recording of that wonderful sigh, when an assembly was going on too long.

There was another assembly when I was a secondary pupil when it was the minister giving a long heartfelt sigh.. The minister did a very good talk on God's infinite love for us which was never ending no matter what. He sat down very pleased with his talk until the rector stood up and said he was annoyed about the number of pupils not singing. Thereafter, teachers would at the entry doors to the hall to check everyone had their hymn book. Any girl without her hymn book would have to do 100 lines and any boy without his hymn book would get the belt (it was the 1960s before equality between boys and girls). I can still see the poor minister, after assuring us of God's love, sighing loudly and slumping down on his chair.

Sometimes ministers forget they are talking to children. After one of my first school assemblies as a teacher one elder member of staff said that he was sure that the ministers talk was 10 mile above the children's heads. In fact, he thought it was 10 mile above the teachers' heads. In fact he felt he had to go further and say it was 10 mile above God's own head.

In Scotland, parents have the right to ask for their children not to take part in RE lessons or religious assemblies. I had very few parents ever ask for this, but after one assembly I got a very irate call from a mother. I was surprised that this particular mother phoned with a complaint as she was very supportive of the school and although she had 4 pleasant but noisy and boisterous boys had never once made a complaint. She had been at an Easter service and had objected to the minister comparing the children with the biggest sinners in prison and she did not want her boys to have to listen to him again. I told her that was her right and I would arrange it. I did however add, that although all of the children were sitting very quietly, no fidgeting or sighing, I was sure none of them were actually listening. I received another call the next morning. She had spoken to the boys and they had no idea what she was talking about (obviously not listening) so they could go back the next time to not listen to him again. I did not add that I was equally sure that most of the school staff were also not listening.

This was proved at another assembly. The deputy head of the school had arranged most of the Easter assembly with a class of children explaining that Easter was a sad and happy time. The minister knew what children were doing and all he had to do was give a short 2 minute talk. He started by saying that he knew Easter was a sad and happy time, but he could not be happy and neither could GOD. All he and God could see this Easter was little Ali sitting in his hospital bed with no hands! (Was first Iraqi war). Unfortunately our last hymn was --Clap your hands all you people shout unto God with a voice of triumph—-hardly suitable. I signalled to the deputy head, and mouthed, what shall we sing? Unfortunately after her part was over she had sat down and did not hear a word the minister had said. It is very difficult to quickly think of a hymn that children can sing unaccompanied and without the words. However, I told everyone we would sing —Bind us together-- for our last hymn. We all sang the first 2 verses, but I then forgot how the third verse started so led my side singing the first verse again. One of the teachers knew the third verse and she led her side with the correct words. Not my finest hour.

Without a doubt school assemblies are tricky.

We celebrated Mother's Day in Church on $10^{\text {th }}$ March.

For many people this is one of the loveliest days of the year but for many it can be one of the loneliest. We thought about all those who found the day difficult and we hope they knew of God's blessing upon them.

We wished all the special ladies in our life a Happy Mother's Day. The Jigsaw children gave their mums beautiful painted plant pots with daffodils planted in them. They also gave the congregation $a$ handmade card.
